HIST-UA 162: Britain & the British Empire Fall 2023 | MW 12.30-1.45 | Kimmel 803

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Description

This course introduces students from any major, school, or year to British history since the establishment of the United Kingdom in 1707. During this period, Britain emerged as the world's primary imperial power and first industrial economy, fought two world wars partly in an effort to maintain that position, and unevenly navigated the post-imperial and post-industrial transformations of the late-twentieth century. Through lectures, readings, and discussions, we will situate the social and political history of modern Britain within this shifting global context.

Assignments

- **Journals:** I will distribute a journal to each student on the first day. We will pass them back and forth throughout the semester, as you respond to various prompts and questions. These journals will be evaluated in the manner of (and in place of) grades for participation and/or attendance, with an emphasis on regular participation and thoughtful engagement.
- Exams: Each of the three exams will include some combination of maps, identification questions, reading passages, and brief essays. You will receive a study guide one week before each exam. With the exception of the specific wording of the essay prompts, there will be nothing on an exam that you have not previously seen on the study guide.
